Dr. John Townsend

Clinical Psychologist, Leadership Consultant and Best-Selling Author

A leadership coach, psychologist and organizational consultant, Dr. Townsend has been helping leaders, organizations and individuals make changes and exceed their goals for more than two decades. His expertise in psychology and leadership help him provide solutions for people in many venues. He has written or co-authored 26 books, including the bestseller *Boundaries*, *Handling Difficult People*, and, most recently, *Leadership Beyond Reason*. His award-winning books have earned three Gold Medallions and the Retailers Choice award for a book and television venture with Time-Life and Integrity Publishers.

Dr. Townsend is highly experienced in a variety of media, including both television appearances and radio. He cohosts the nationally syndicated talk show *New Life Live* with an audience of 3 million.

Dr. Townsend founded and built a health care company which operated inpatient and outpatient treatment centers for 10 years in the western part of the U.S., totaling 35 cities. He was also clinical director during that period. During the company's tenure, he learned and produced the principles and strategies of success and change that he now uses in his writing, speaking, consulting and media.

As a partner in Cloud-Townsend Resources, Dr. Townsend has produced and spoken at many public seminars and conferences nationally on a variety of topics, ranging from leadership and success to personal growth, relationships and spirituality. His talks are often linked down by satellite to thousands of live venues.

Dr. Townsend works with leaders and organizations in a number of ways, including team and key executive coaching, corporate consulting, training workshops, and speaking at conferences. He personally conducts his own Leadership Coaching Programs in Newport Beach, Calif., Dallas, Texas, and Indianapolis, Ind.

John holds a Bachelor's Degree in psychology from North Carolina State University, a Master's in Theology from Dallas Seminary, and a Ph.D. in Clinical Psychology from Biola University. He is active on the board of Mustard Seed Ranch, a ranch program for abused children, does training for leaders in third world countries.

Dr. George E. Young, Sr.

Pastor, Holy Temple Baptist Church

Chairperson, Faith to Government, Inc.

Dr. George E. Young, Sr. currently serves as the Senior Pastor at Holy Temple Baptist Church in Oklahoma City. A former Commissioner for the Oklahoma Department of Human Services and former Board Certified Chaplain with the Association of Professional Chaplains, Dr. Young currently serves as the Chairperson for Faith to Government, Inc. and Commissioner for the One Awards, which selects non-profits from across the state for high performance.

Dr. Young is one of the founding members of the task force on minority health with the State Department of Health. He is board member and/or trustee for Red Cross of Central Oklahoma, United Way of Central Oklahoma, Big Brothers and Big Sisters of Oklahoma, Leadership Oklahoma City and Phillips Theological Seminary. He is the founding president for the African American Clergy for the Prevention of Aids.

An outstanding member of the community, Dr. Young has received the “Good Neighbor” award for community development from the Oklahoma Conference of Churches and “Community Service Award” from the Interfaith Alliance of Oklahoma. He led Holy Temple in the construction of an independent living senior housing project (Temple Gardens), which received the Oklahoma Housing Finance Agency’s “2007 Honoring Excellence in Affordable Housing Award in the Elderly Housing Category.”

Dr. Young holds a Doctor of Ministry, Master’s in Ministry, M.Div., and a Master’s of Business Administration, and he is currently under supervision for licensing as an alcohol and drug counselor. Additionally, he is a Certified Behavioral Health Case Manager. He completed a Merrill Fellowship with Harvard Divinity School, in Cambridge, Mass., in 1996. He completed the “Sabbatical Grant for Pastoral Leaders” from the Louisville Institute of Louisville Seminary (Lily Foundation).

Steven Buck

Deputy Commissioner, Oklahoma Department of Mental Health and Substance Abuse Services

Steven Buck serves as Deputy Commissioner for Communications and Prevention at the Oklahoma Department of Mental Health and Substance Abuse Services (ODMHSAS). In this capacity, Buck directs the ODMHSAS prevention and provider certification initiatives and oversees both internal and external communications. He also serves as the agency lead on state legislative relations.

Prior to joining ODMHSAS in August 2007, Buck enjoyed a 10-year career with the National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI). During his tenure, he served in multiple capacities, including director of state policy, director of state relations and executive director of NAMI Oklahoma. As director of state policy, Buck provided oversight and consultation in the area of public policy development to the 50 NAMI state organizations.

Buck has advocacy experience in multiple state legislatures and has been involved in numerous campaigns and policy initiatives. A native Oklahoman, he is a graduate of Oklahoma State University with a Bachelor’s Degree in agricultural economics.

R. Darrell Weaver

Director, Oklahoma Bureau of Narcotics and Dangerous Drugs Control

R. Darrell Weaver has served as the Director of the Oklahoma Bureau of Narcotics and Dangerous Drugs Control since September 2006. Weaver has held various assignments throughout the state since his first appointment as an agent with the Oklahoma Bureau of Narcotics in 1987. Weaver graduated from Cameron University with a Bachelor’s of Accounting Degree and was Cameron’s 2009 Distinguished Alumni Award recipient. He earned a Master of Business Administration from Oklahoma Christian University and is a graduate of the FBI National Academy 199th session. An alumnus of Leadership Oklahoma, Leadership Oklahoma City and the 2011 COMMStar Program, Weaver is also a state board member for Big Brothers and Big Sisters of Oklahoma.

Jim Priest

Executive Director, Fighting Addiction Through Education (FATE)

Jim Priest is the Executive Director of FATE and brings to the position 30 years of experience in the legal, business and nonprofit sectors. Priest is a licensed attorney who practiced law with two leading law firms in Oklahoma City, trying nearly 100 lawsuits and advising public and private clients as well as corporate organizations and individuals on a wide variety of legal matters. He wrote a column on business ethics for many years in the Journal Record and a column on family-related issues in The Oklahoman. He has also been a regular guest commentator on News 9 in Oklahoma City.

Priest has a long history of service through the nonprofit sector, having served as President of the Regional Food Bank of Oklahoma as well as a board member for Habitat for Humanity, Boy Scouts, Variety Health Center, The Bethany Public School Foundation, Calm Waters and Oklahoma City First Church of the Nazarene.

Priest is an active member of Bethany First Church of the Nazarene where he leads men's groups and teaches Sunday School. He is a co-founder of Marriage Network Oklahoma and was a founding member of the Oklahoma Business Ethics Consortium. He has regularly appeared on television and before groups speaking and writing a wide variety of topics. Priest is also a member of Leadership Oklahoma and Leadership Oklahoma City.

In 2012, Priest was awarded the "Preventionist of the Year" by the American Athletic Institute for his work in creating the program "Oklahoma Life of An Athlete." He has also received the "Alliance Achievement Award" from the Partnership at drugfree.org.

Priest was born in Syracuse, N.Y., and graduated from Houghton College and Syracuse University Law School before moving to Oklahoma in 1980.

Rev. Allen Carson

Pastor, First United Methodist Church of Chandler

Reverend Allen Carson currently serves as the Pastor at First United Methodist Church in Chandler. He has served United Methodist Churches across Oklahoma the past 21 years as children, youth and family minister, and as senior pastor for the past 11 years.

Over the past 22 years, Rev. Carson has worked with children, youth and young adults in foster care and juvenile justice programs. He has tutored and mentored in juvenile detention centers and alternative schools, and currently serves as a trainer and consultant with the Oklahoma Federation of Families and Oklahoma Systems of Care. He leads independent living workshops and training sessions for youth and adults.

Rev. Carson's work within the church has focused on strengthening churches' relationships with people at the margins to offer spiritual, emotional and material resources. As a former foster child in Oklahoma's foster care program, he is asked often to speak on issues related to the foster care system, share ways communities can help youth and young adults with behavioral and mental health issues, and share his personal story. The church, teachers, mentors and Citizens Caring for Children (CCC) had a profound impact on Rev. Carson's journey from foster care into adulthood.

Rev. Carson earned his undergraduate degree in Family, Marriage Relations, and Child Development from the University of Central Oklahoma and his Master of Divinity Degree from Perkins School of Theology at Southern Methodist University in Dallas.
