

Allen Gamble Correctional Center (AGCC), formerly known as Davis Correctional Facility, is a 1723-bed, medium and maximum security prison for men located in Holdenville, Oklahoma. The prison first opened in 1996 and was formerly owned by CoreCivic (formerly known as Corrections Corporation of America). AGCC is named after fallen officer Sgt. Joe Allen Gamble Jr., who lost his life at the Oklahoma State Reformatory in Granite on June 5, 2000.



Education

Many inmates lack education, a key component in avoiding re-incarceration. Most inmates lack education, a key component in avoiding re-incarceration. AGCC offers the following classes: Literacy, Pre-High School Equivalency, and High School Equivalency. Through TABE testing, educational needs and class placement are identified. Literacy, Pre-HSE, and HSE classes have a capacity for 24 students each.



CareerTech

A partnership with CareerTech helps inmates obtain meaningful employment after discharge. CareerTech provides inmates at AGCC with technical training in Electrical, Horticulture, and Career Readiness. Each CareerTech program has 12 seats available.

Pen Pals Prison Program

The Pen Pals prison program teaches inmates at AGCC to train shelter dogs into well-mannered companion dogs who are then adopted by people in the community. Research shows that the inmates benefit as much as the dogs and their new owners. The inmates become more patient and tolerant, learn a skill and the value of community service. Their increased confidence, empathy, and ability to share emotions with the dogs open new ways of thinking and relating to others, making a significant difference in their lives and the lives of the families, staff, and other inmates.
