

Dick Conner Correctional Center (DCCC) is a medium-security prison with a minimum unit located in Hominy. The prison, which now houses nearly 1,200 men, received its first inmates in 1979. DCCC is named after former Oklahoma State Penitentiary Warden and Osage County Sheriff R.B. "Dick" Conner.



Substance Abuse Treatment



For those inmates who need substance abuse treatment, DCCC teaches them ways to avoid drug and alcohol use, while also helping them develop cognitive, social, emotional, and coping skills needed to avoid using.



Criminal Thinking

DCCC offers Thinking for a Change, Moral Reconation Therapy, and Associates 4 Success programs to address thinking, judgment errors, and relationships linked with criminal thinking/behavior.



Education

DCCC offers literacy courses as well as Pre-High School Equivalency and High School Equivalency diplomas. Associate and/or Bachelor degrees may be achieved through

facility partnerships with Tulsa Community College and Langston University. Inmates may attend the colleges free through Pell Grant funding. As of December 2019, 12% of DCCC population was enrolled in the program.

Specialized Units
