KEY: **KOP = Keep On Person**: Medications that are designated by the Pharmacy and Therapeutics Committee as eligible for inmate possession, subject to approval by a medical provider and the facility CHSA. Individual inmate KOP status is further dependent upon the provider's discretion. (OP-140130)

**PL = Pill Line**: Medications that are designated and restricted by the Pharmacy and Therapeutics Committee to be kept only in the possession of and administered by an Oklahoma Department of Corrections qualified health care professional. The facility CHSA and/or medical provider may designate any medication (e.g., KOP medications) to be restricted to pill line. (OP-140130)

**Controlled Substances** = narcotics (codeine, hydrocodone, oxycodone, etc.), tramadol (Ultram), benzodiazepines (Valium, Ativan, etc.), and butalbital (Fioricet).

CO = Correctional Officer DOT = Directly Observed Therapy (direct observation of inmate ingesting medication)
