**54% of deaths** occurred at a home or apartment.

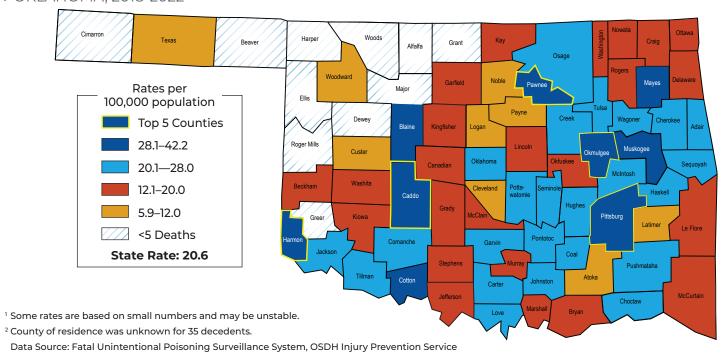
NON-HISPANIC WHITE

Adair County residents had the **highest** rate of death.

- Males were **2.5 times more likely** to die than females.
- Drug overdose **death rates increased 2%** from 26 per 100,000 (2013-2017) to 26.6 per 100,000 (2018-2022).
- 71% of people who died had a history of substance use.
- **18**% of people who died had a history of mental health problems.

Adair County Residents

hospitalized for a nonfatal drug overdose from 2020-2022.

- **52**% of hospitalizations were unintentional and **44**% due to self harm.
- Males were **27% more likely** to be hospitalized than females.
- Drug overdose **hospitalization rates decreased 31%** from 118.7 per 100,000 (2017-2019) to 82 per 100,000 (2020-2022).
- Non-Hispanic White Adair County residents had the **highest rate** of hospitalizations.

The most common substances involved in hospitalizations were:

- Opioids
- ▶ Non-opioid pain medications
- ▶ Benzodiazepines
- **▶** Antidepressants
- **▶** Stimulants
