
- Males were 22% more likely to die than females.
- Drug overdose **death rates decreased 16**% from 19.5 per 100,000 (2013-2017) to 16.3 per 100,000 (2018-2022).
- 62% of people who died had a history of substance use.
- 15% of people who died had a history of mental health problems.

hospitalized for a nonfatal drug overdose from 2020-2022.

- 42% of hospitalizations were unintentional and 58% due to self harm.
- Females were **94% more likely** to be hospitalized than males.
- Drug overdose **hospitalization rates increased 8%** from 84 per 100,000 (2017-2019) to 90.8 per 100,000 (2020-2022).
- Non-Hispanic White Bryan County residents had the **highest rate** of hospitalizations.

The most common substances involved in hospitalizations were:

- **▶** Benzodiazepines
- ▶ Non-opioid pain medications
- Opioids
- Antidepressants
- **▶** Stimulants
