



Suicide In OKLAHOMA

OKLAHOMA







In 2020, there were 853 suicides among Oklahoma residents age 10 and older. This translates to a suicide rate of 24.7 deaths per 100,000 Oklahoma residents.

Of the decedents, 79% were male and 21% were female.

Suicides comprised 69% of all violent deaths (1,244).


The mean age of decedents was 45 years; decedents ranged in age from 10 to 94 years.

Males had a higher suicide rate across all age groups compared to females (**Figure 1**).

Suicide rates were highest among males age 85 and older at 68.7 deaths per 100,000 residents, and highest amongst females age 35-44 at 13.5 deaths per 100,000 residents (**Figure 1**).

The suicide rate among American Indian, non-Hispanic decedents was 35% higher than White, non-Hispanic decedents and more than double any other race or ethnic group (**Figure 2**).







Firearms were the leading method of suicide for both males (68%) and females (39%), followed by hanging/strangulation, 24% and 34%, respectively (**Figure 3**).

Females had a higher percentage of poisoning as the method of suicide (20%) compared to males (4%) (**Figure 3**).

Among males, the leading life circumstances experienced by decedents were intimate partner problems (39%), depressed mood (36%), and substance use problems (31%) (**Figure 4**).

Among females, the leading life circumstances experienced by decedents were mental health problems (55%), depressed mood (36%), and intimate partner problems (34%) (**Figure 4**).





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The Oklahoma Violent Death Reporting System (OKVDRS) is a statewide surveillance system for suicides, homicides, undetermined manner deaths, unintentional firearm injury deaths and legal intervention deaths. Data are collected from medical examiner reports, death certificates, and law enforcement reports.
