## **parentPRO Data Discussion**

*Community Epidemiology and Evaluation (OSDH)*

- Question and answer needs for reports -- as all things data are discussed.
  - Question: Can I add a re-entry to the “Efforts to Outcomes” (ETO)?
    - Answer: You can re-enroll them through “Intake Triage”.
  - Question: Will the Adult Performance Report (APR) be available soon?
    - Answer: The within 90 days is still in process until the adult information is finalized. You are able to pull those reports yourself.
  - Question: Can you use the audit report?
    - NO, the audit report will not give a clear number.
  - Is the “Life Skills Progression” (LSP) going to be put on IRENE?
    - More information coming.
  - Referral Tracking -- Can the dashboard be updated to say “Completed” or “Updated”?
    - The data person will try to get it to operate like the “Goal Plan”.
    - A how-to guide will be created and emailed to everyone in the meantime.
  - Have we decided when nurses will document into ETO?
    - Has been delayed due to legal issues.
    - Data person will address with Children First director and consultant after APR.
    - Parent Educators can enter now, but NOT nurses.

# Defining Stress

---

## ◉ Individual variation

- Perception to stress (subjective)
- Response to stress (objective)

## ◉ Positive Stress

- Brief, infrequent, fairly normal childhood experiences
- Promote healthy growth and development

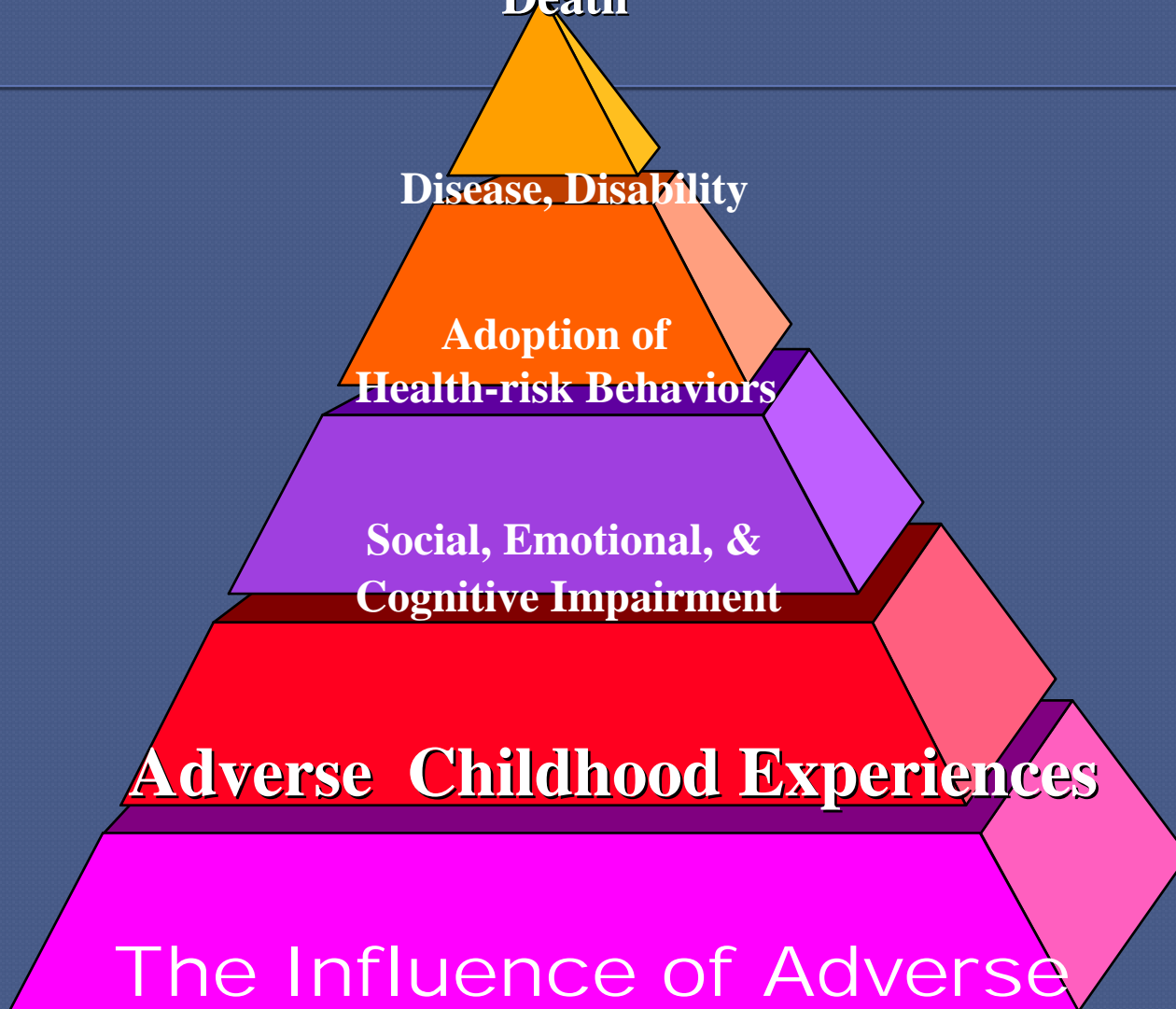

# Social Outcomes

---

- ◉ Loss of productivity
  - Job dysfunction (absences, poor performance, financial problems)
  - Loss of years of life expectancy
- ◉ Educational issues
- ◉ Higher health care costs
- ◉ Involvement in criminal justice or child welfare systems

# Brokenhearted

---

- ◉ A major cause of living brokenhearted is shame
- ◉ Shame is the pain of feeling like you aren't worthy of love, belonging or connection

# Broken Hearts

---

- ◉ Kids who are abused and neglected feel shame
  - Direct messaging – “I didn’t want you”
  - Indirect messaging –  
you’re not worth \_\_\_\_\_  
it’s ok to abuse you  
you’re an object



# Brokenhearted

---

Shame is associated with high rates of:

Obesity

Crime

Relational and work dysfunction

# RESILIENCE

(noun) the power to RETURN to the original form after being bent, compressed or stretched

“the manifestation of positive adaptation *despite* significant life adversity”

Luthar 2003

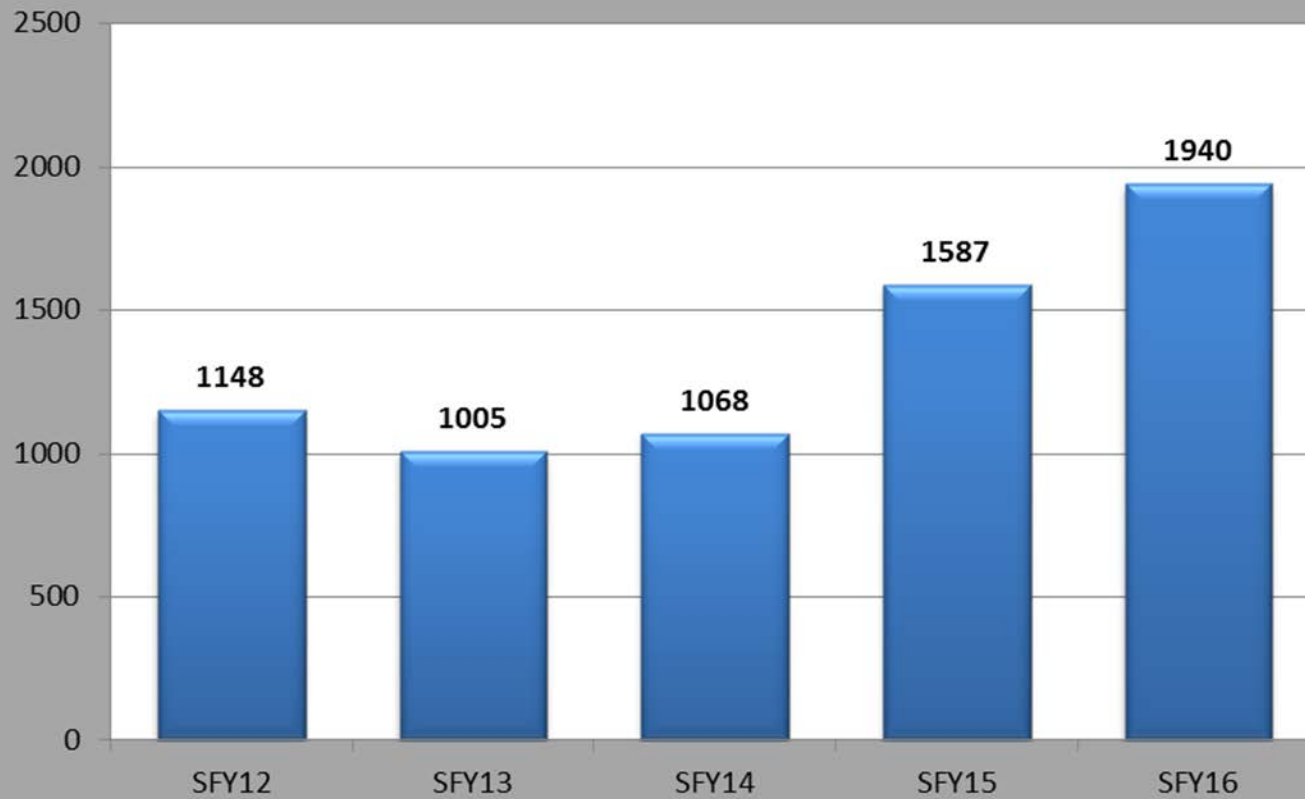
*Protective factors* are individual or environmental characteristics, conditions, or behaviors that reduce the effects of stressful life events. These factors also increase an individual's ability to avoid risks or hazards, and promote social and emotional competence to thrive in all aspects of life, now and in the future.

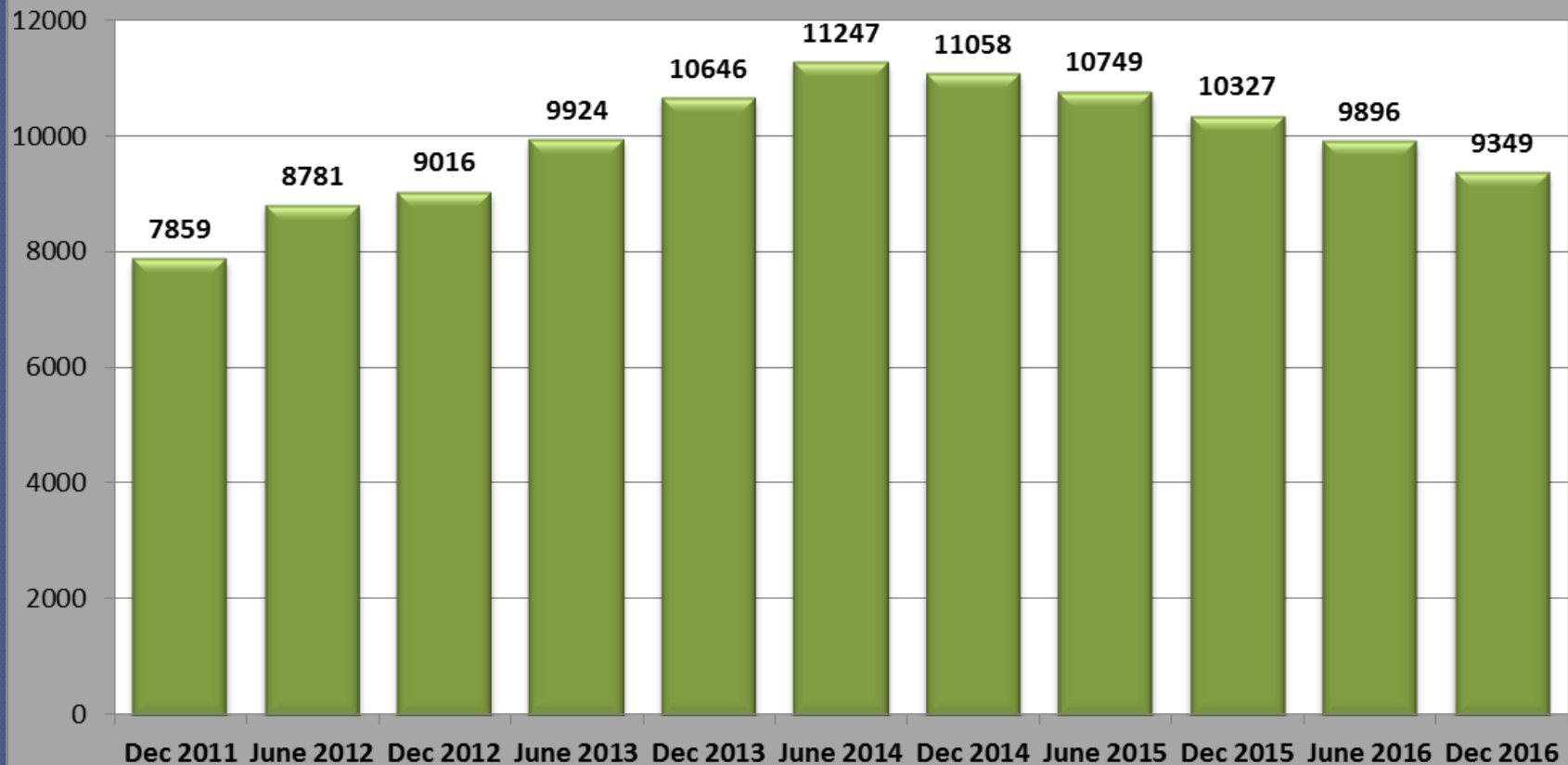


## FCS Families Served: SFY12 - SFY16



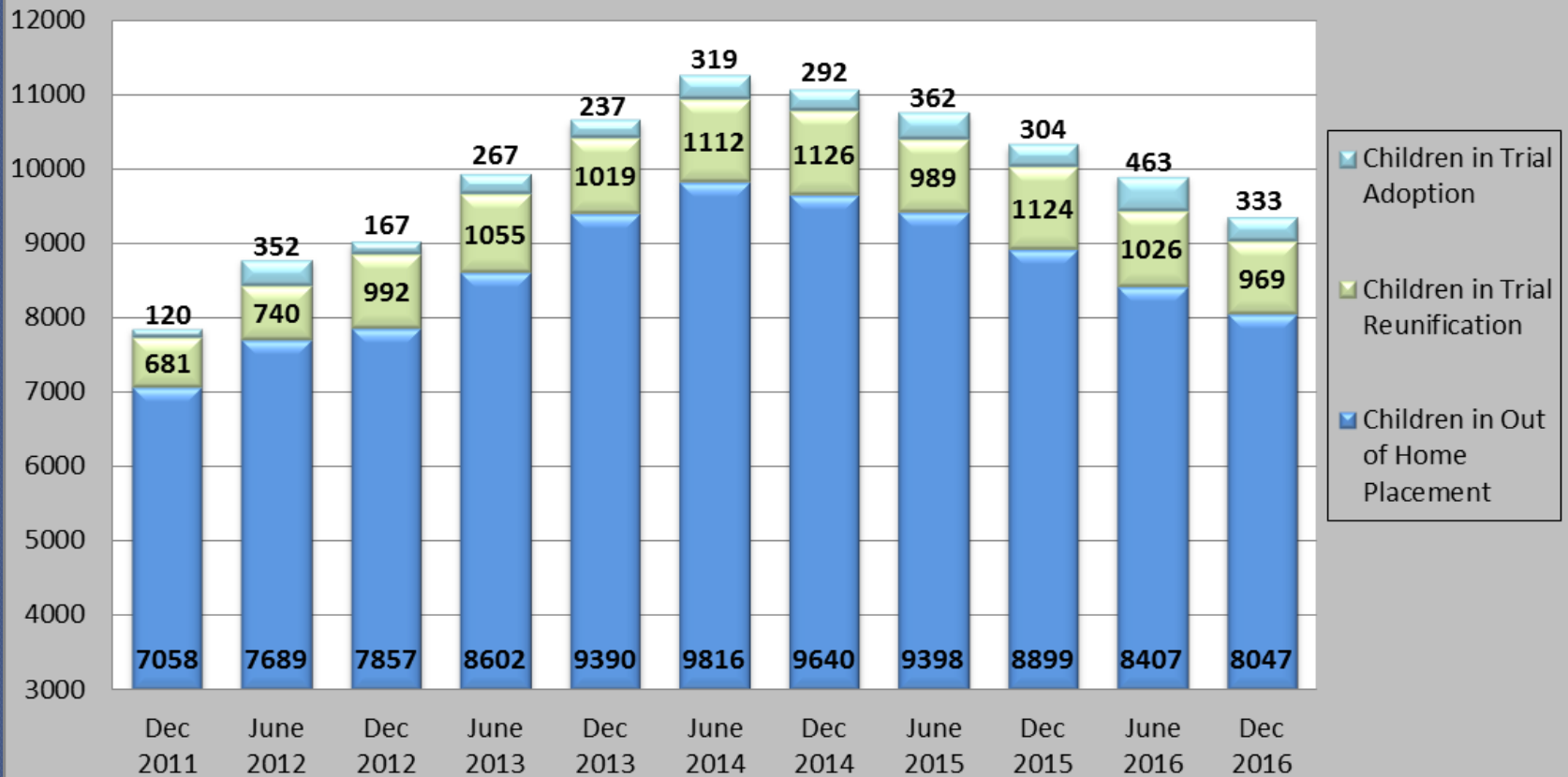

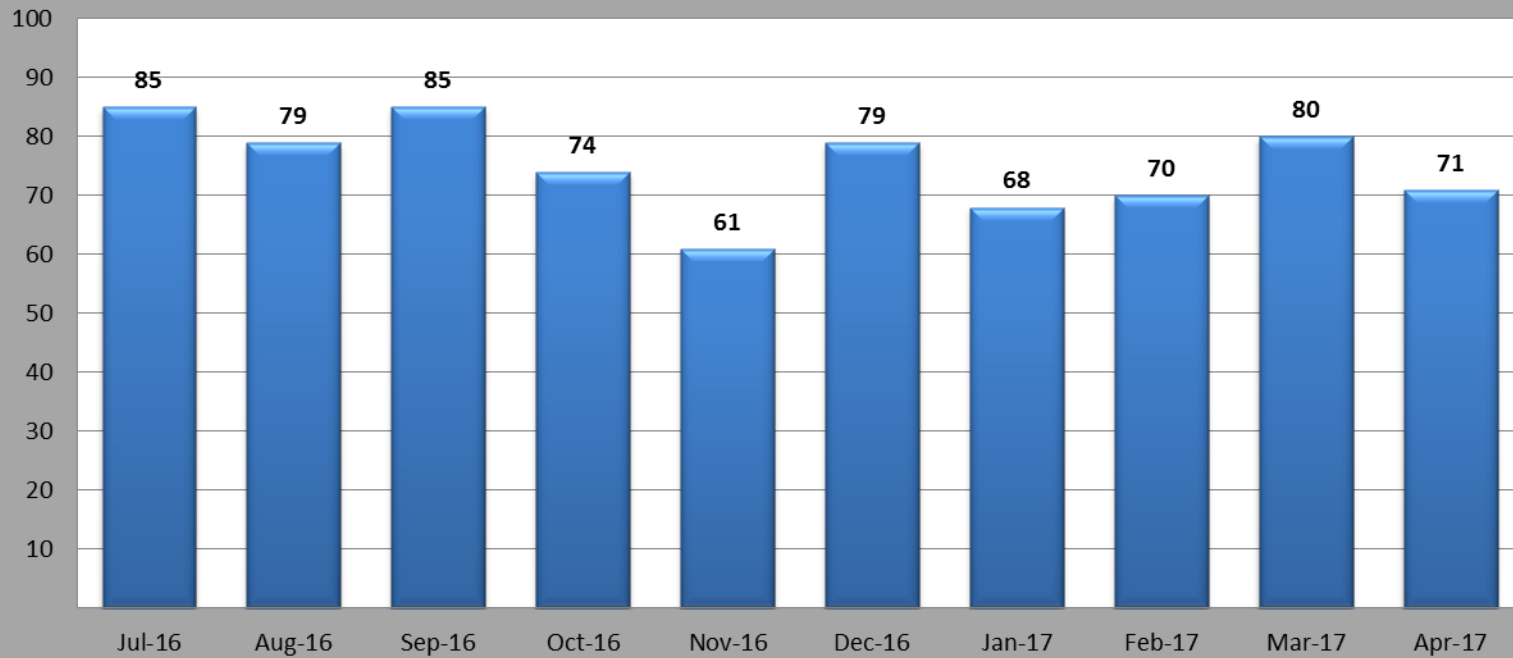
## Children in Out of Home Care at End of Month

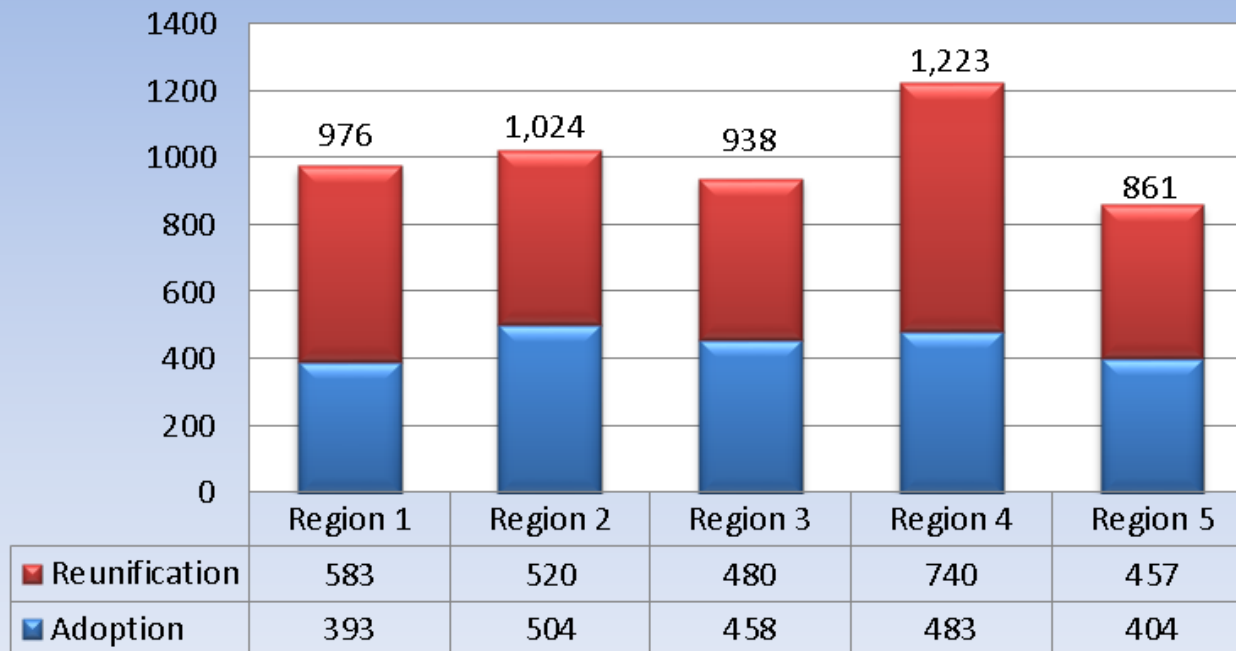

# Resilience

---

## ○ Medical Home

- “Ramped up” visitation schedule for foster/high-risk kids
  - 1<sup>st</sup> 24-48 hours
  - Monthly for a couple of months (health, behavior, development)
  - At least every 3-6 months, even if stable
  - At transitions

# Resilience

---

## ○ Mental Health Care

- Screening and referral
- Trauma toolkit for health care providers
- Use evidenced-based treatments when appropriate
  - PCIT, TF-CBT, TBRI, etc.
  - Counseling before medicine in most situations

# Psychotropic Med Use

---

- ◉ 15 million U.S. children/youth have psychiatric disorders
  - ADHD
  - Depression
  - Anxiety
  - OCD
  - Bipolar d/o
- ◉ Trauma clouds the diagnosis









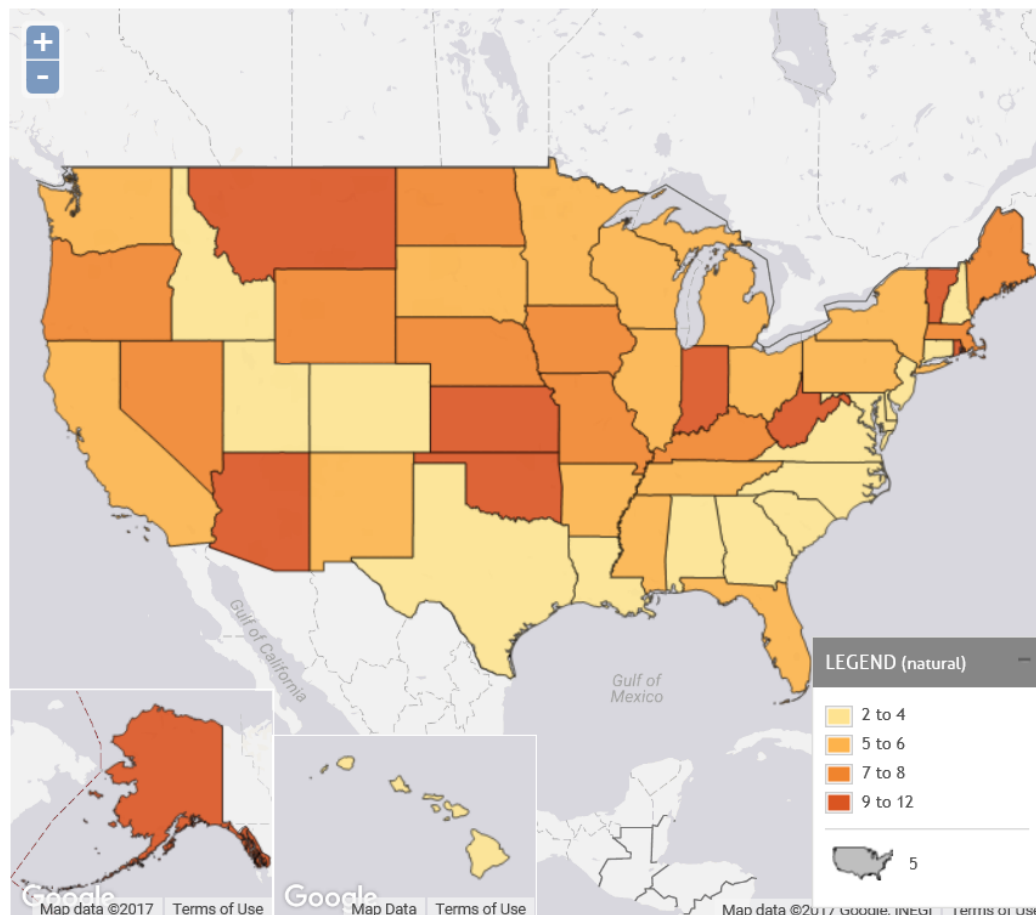


# Oklahoma ranks 50<sup>th</sup> in the US for Children in Foster Care per 1000 Children in Population (2014 Data)

# Tipping Point Factors??

---

- ◉ Dignity – you have a purpose in the community
- ◉ Beauty – you are a valuable part of the community
- ◉ Accountability – you are expected to be a healthy part of the community

# Tipping Point Factors?

---

- ◉ Dignity – you are worth listening to
- ◉ Beauty – you are worth connecting with others (community, culture, family)
- ◉ Accountability - we will be honest with and about you
