



Youthful Offender Data

Charging a child as a youthful offender allows the State to ensure public safety by holding children accountable for serious crimes while affording courts methods of rehabilitation for those children in the juvenile justice system through the custody or supervision of the Office of Juvenile Affairs.



Looking Forward

In 2017, the Office of Juvenile Affairs will focus on the following;

- Establish a data governance committee to promote data driven decision making across the agency.
- Promoting polices intended to increase levels of family engagement.
- Enhancing reimbursement rates for group home providers.
- Investing in the modernization of technology available to staff; laptops, cell phones, etc.
- Increasing the number of traditional and therapeutic foster homes available for placement.
- Funding workforce development specialists to help OJA youth leave custody workforce ready.
