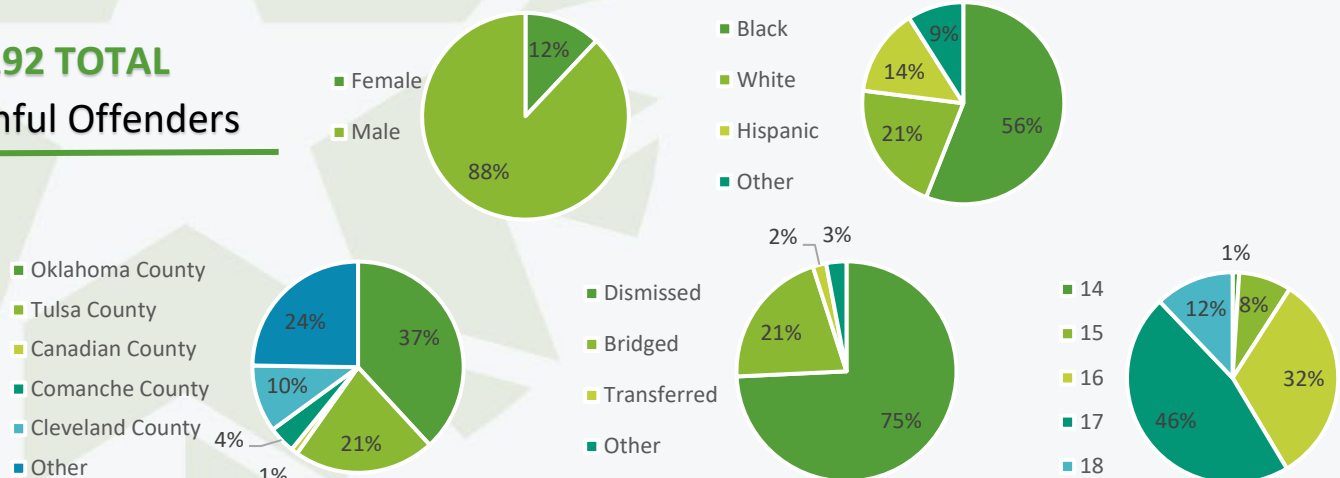
The Oklahoma Youth Academy Charter School (OYACS) provides educational services to children in secure care settings.



Youthful Offender Data

Charging a child as a youthful offender allows the State to ensure public safety by holding children accountable for serious crimes while affording courts methods of rehabilitation for those children in the juvenile justice system through the custody or supervision of the Office of Juvenile Affairs.

Looking Forward

In 2022, the Office of Juvenile Affairs will focus on the following;

- Revising the Youthful Offender Act to resolve contradictory and repetitive language which makes its application vary across the state.
- Improving data collection from other state and federal agencies as well as contracted service providers.
- Recruitment and retention of secure-care treatment staff and local OJA field office staff.
- Keeping construction of the Next Generation campus on time and on budget.
- Launch a plan to expand educational services through the Oklahoma Youth Academy Charter School.
- Ensure all new clinical hires are licensed.
- Review the agency's mission, vision, and goals for potential revisions/updates.
