





*YLS/CMI is an evidence-based instrument that measures risk and need factors in 8 domains providing an overall score that indicates a youth's risk for recidivism. The levels of degree range from low (would likely not contribute) to very high (would likely contribute).






Education Data

Youthful Offender Data

Charging a child as a youthful offender allows the State to ensure public safety by holding children accountable for serious crimes while affording courts methods of rehabilitation for those children in the juvenile justice system through the custody or supervision of the Office of Juvenile Affairs.



Looking Forward

In 2020, the Office of Juvenile Affairs will focus on the following;

- Establishing and instituting performance-incentive pay for field and institutional staff.
- Breaking ground on the new intake building on the Next Generation campus.
- Strengthening the role of OJA's new chief psychologist, Dr. Paul Shawler, as he cultivates relationships with pschiatrists, medical providers, and other mental health consultants at OJA facilities.
- Shift contracts with community-based youth service agencies from a cost reimbursement model to a feefor-service arrangements based on the BKD LLP performance assessment.
- Update state statute to reflect language signed into law by HR 6964 which amended the Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention Act (JJDPA).
