On June 9, 2006, Governor Brad Henry signed the Medicaid Reform Bill (HB 2842), which charges the Oklahoma Health Care Authority with implementing several measures to curb costs and expand patient options and access to care. Section 5 of HB 2842 instructs the OHCA, in cooperation with other state part-

ners, to develop "an incentive reimbursement rate plan" for nursing facilities. Quality measures may include, but not

SENATE BILL 2017 THE OPPORTUNITIES FOR INDEPENDENT LIVING ACT

Passed in May, 2006, the Opportunities for Independent Living Act (SB 2017) charges with Oklahoma Health Care Authority with broad responsibilities focused on individuals with disabilities. OHCA is instructed to support service delivery systems for individuals "ensuring that the individuals, their families, or guardians are well informed as to the types of services and resources available.," and to encourage independence, self-esteem, self-worth, and self-choice, regardless of the severity of the disability.

The Act created a Strategic Planning Committee on the Olmstead Decision, which upholds the Americans with Disabilities Act, by affirming the right of individuals with disabilities to live in their community. As part of the Oklahoma Opportunities for Independent Living Act, OHCA and the Department of Human Services Aging Division will initiate a 3 year pilot program to test methods that would identify individuals who prefer to receive services in a community setting and eliminate barriers so individuals with disabilities currently living in institutions to transition into the community. Program components could include:

- establishing a presence in hospitals to reduce inappropriate hospitalizations,
- · paying rent and utility deposits,
- purchase initial household supplies, furniture, and appliances,
- pay moving expenses, and
- ensure access to safe, affordable housing.
