The State of Charter Schools in Oklahoma

This report is an effort to comply with the Oklahoma Charter Schools Act that requires an annual report to be submitted by the State Board of Education, “to the Legislature and the Governor outlining the status of charter schools in the state.”

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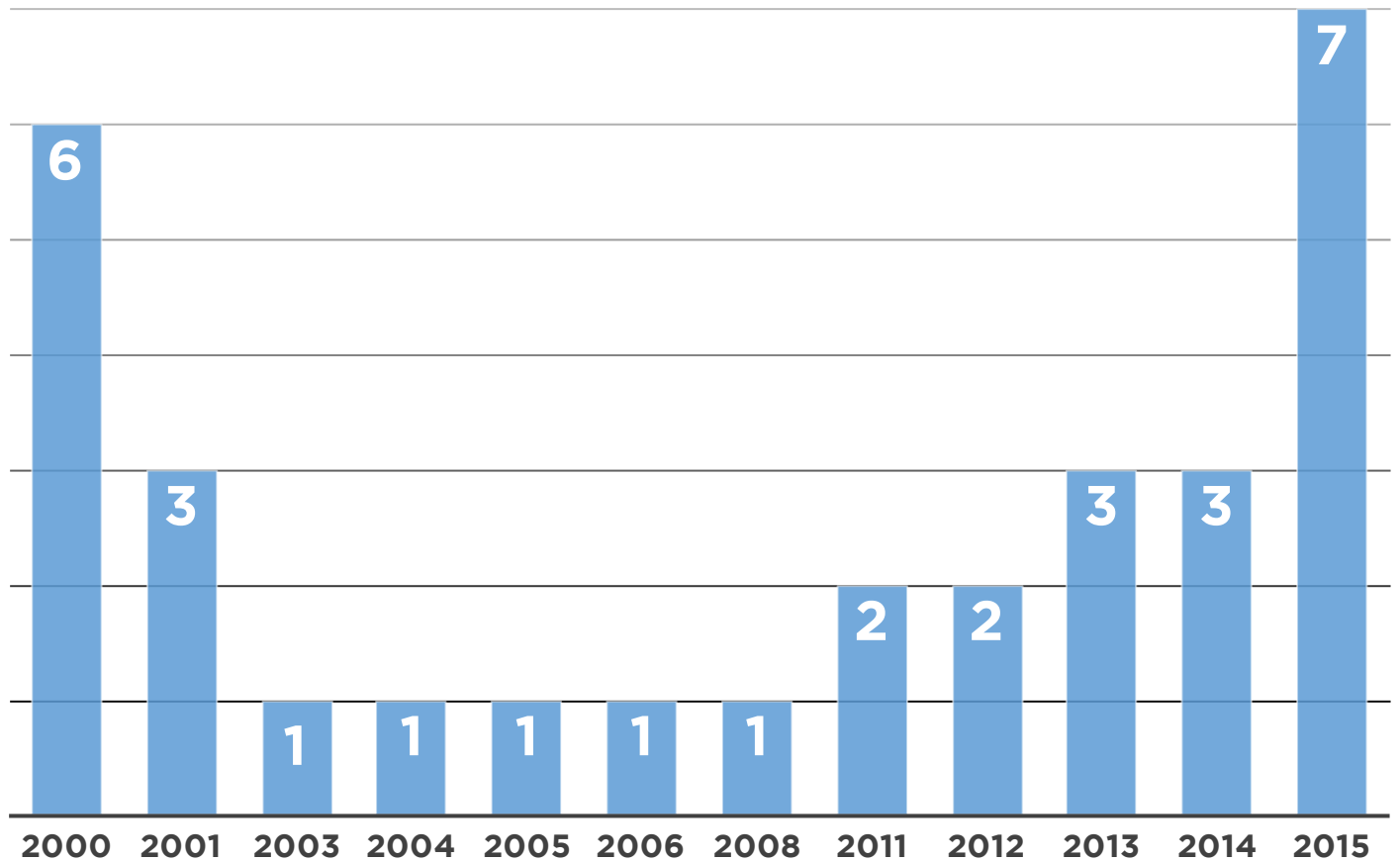
Introduction: The State of Charter Schools in Oklahoma

Since the passing of the Oklahoma Charter Schools Act in 1999, there have been a total of 31 charter schools founded in Oklahoma.

In 2015, along with the statewide expansion of charter schools, amendments to the Oklahoma Charter Schools Act (the “Act”) also brought a new level of accountability. According to the National Alliance for Public Charter Schools, Oklahoma made the biggest jump in state charter law rankings because of the overhaul of its law, including statewide expansion, school and authorizer accountability, and replication of high-quality charters. Further, upon the overhaul of Oklahoma’s charter law, National Association of Charter School Authorizers (NACSA) stated that “Oklahoma now has one of the nation’s strongest charter laws ... with a focus on school accountability and strong standards for authorizers.”

Oklahoma law now requires that the State, as well as charter authorizers, provide annual performance reviews of charter schools. In fact, the Act is replete with requirements that work to ensure that charter schools are meeting the terms of the school’s charter, its academic, and/or its operational goals and measurable achievement benchmarks. Specifically, the Act grants a sponsor the affirmative power and duty to “provide oversight of the operations of the charter school ... through annual performance reviews of charter schools and reauthorization of charter schools for which it is a sponsor.”

Number of Charter Schools Opened By Year



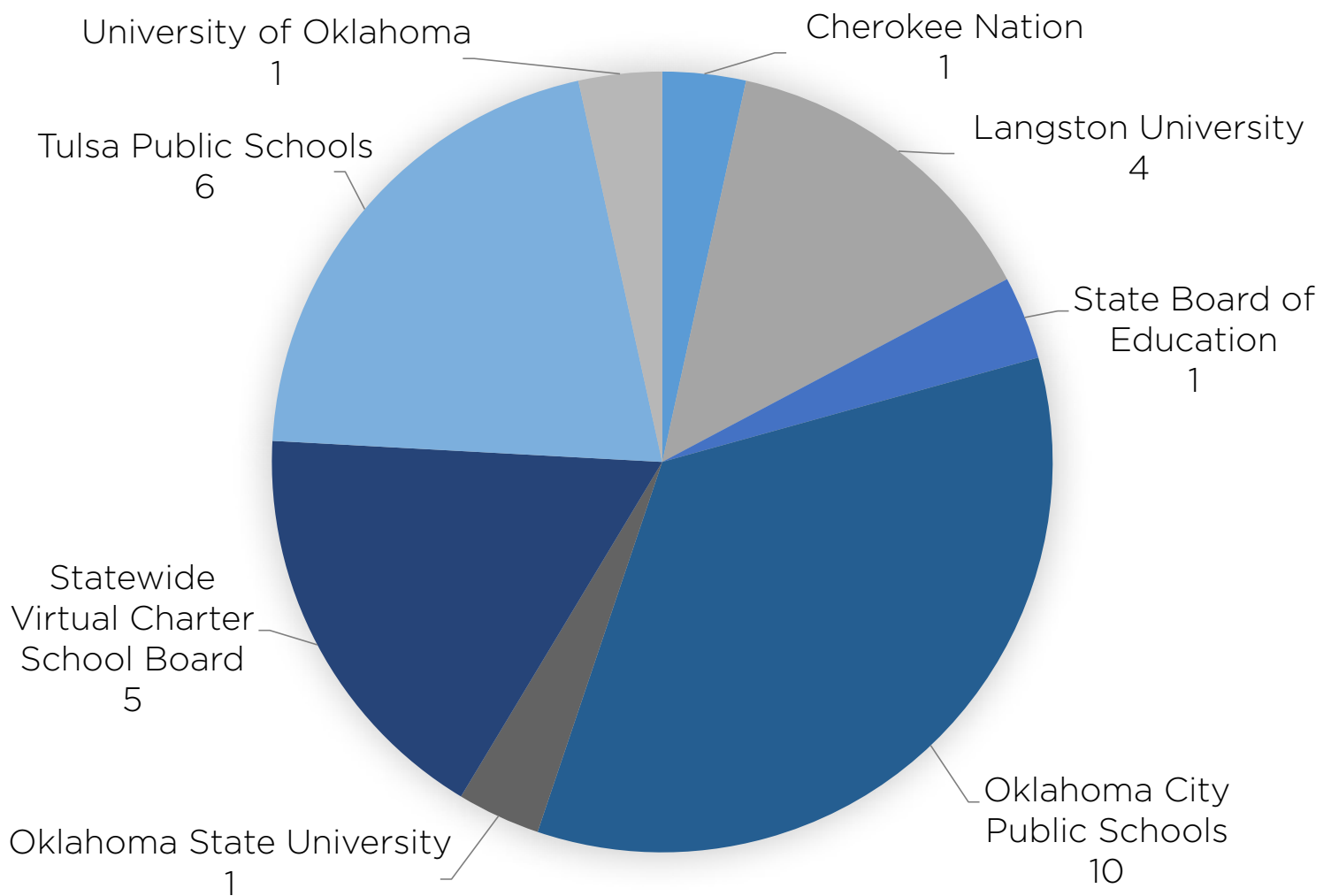

Schools Per Authorizer

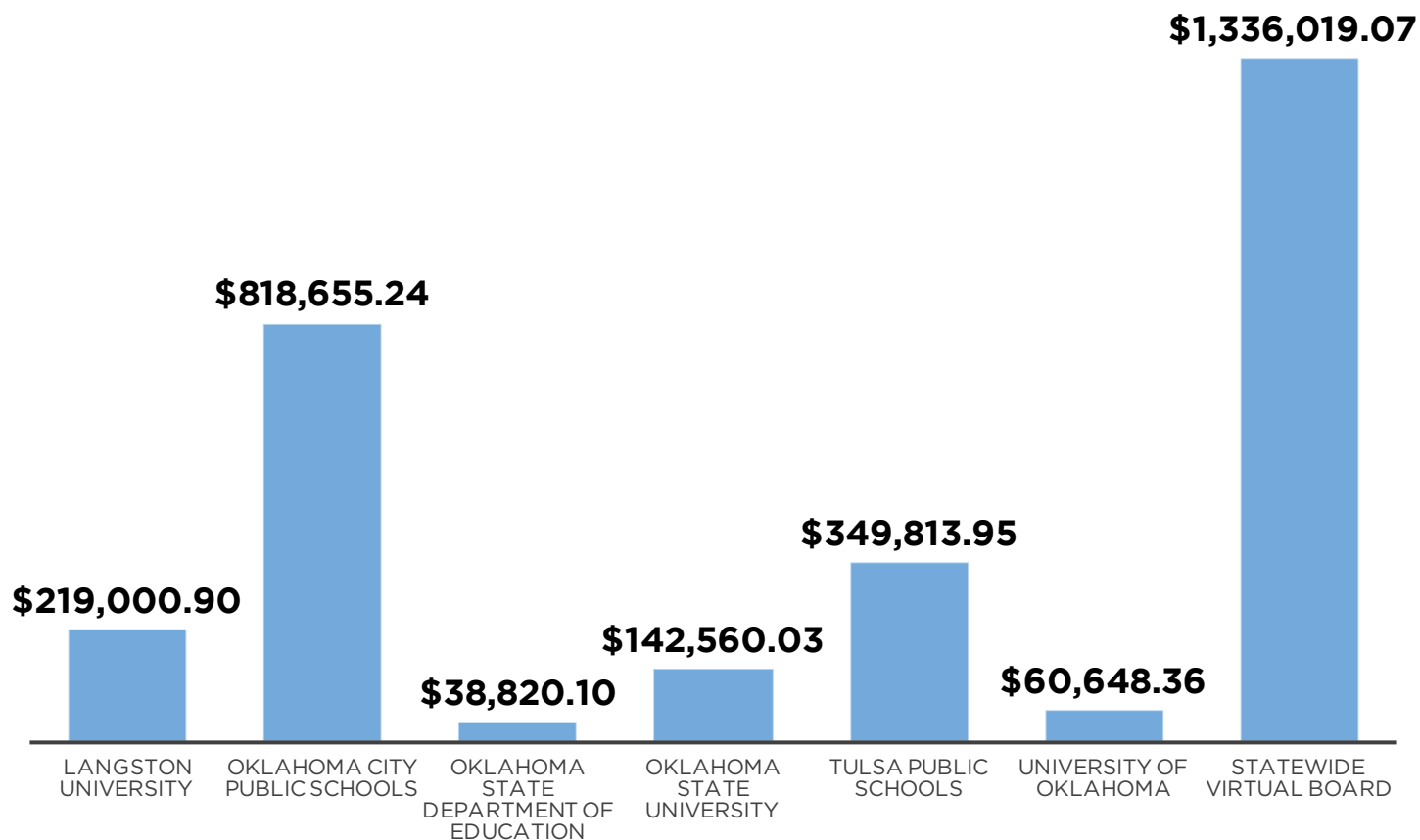

Oklahoma Charter Authorizers (continued)

The Act allows authorizers/sponsors to collect a fee for administrative services that must not exceed 5% of the charter school's State Aid allocation. The graph below shows the estimated fees collected by authorizers during the 2015-2016 school year.

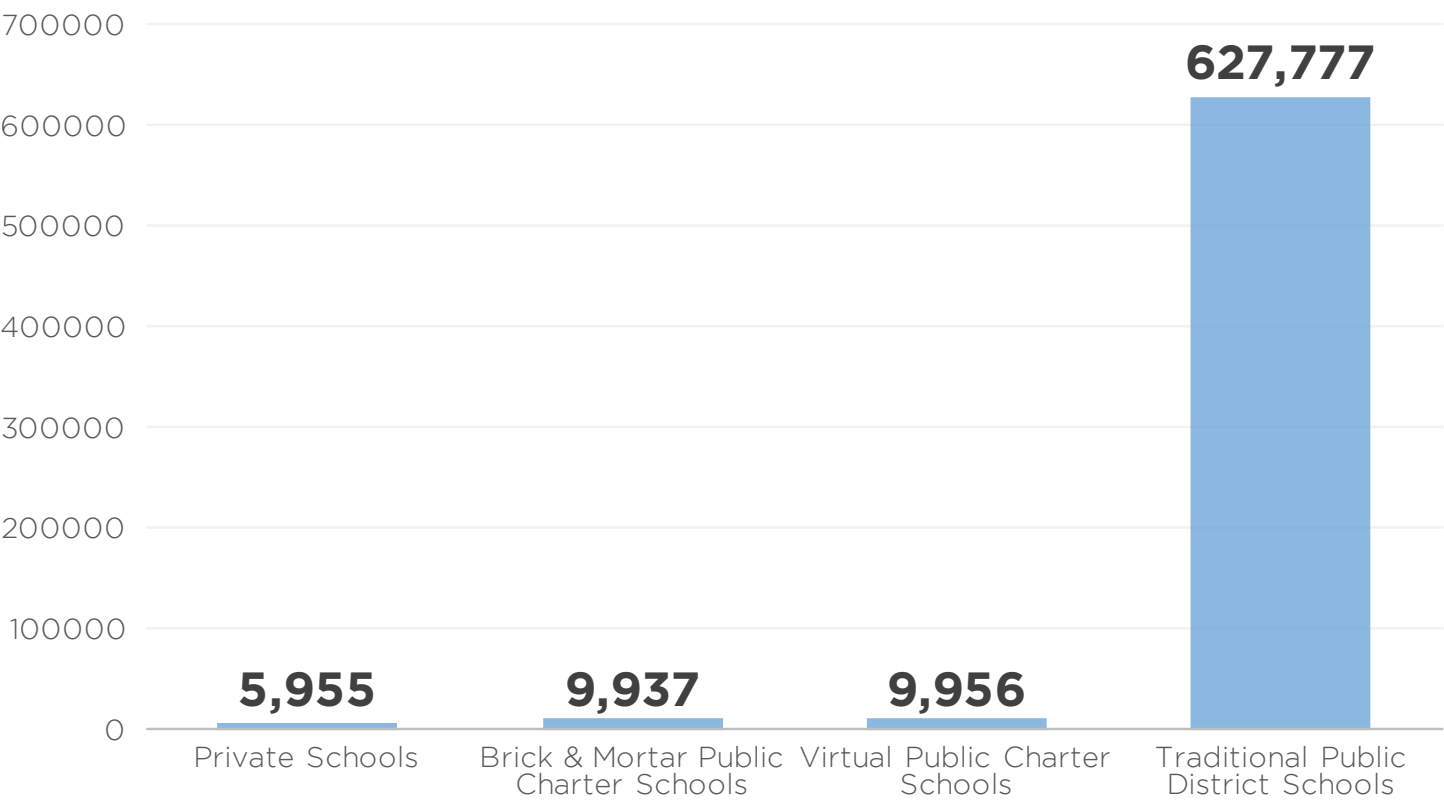
Administrative Services Fee Collection 2015-2016 School Year

During the 2015-2016 school year, there were a total of 697,625 students enrolled in state accredited Oklahoma schools. The breakdown is shown below:

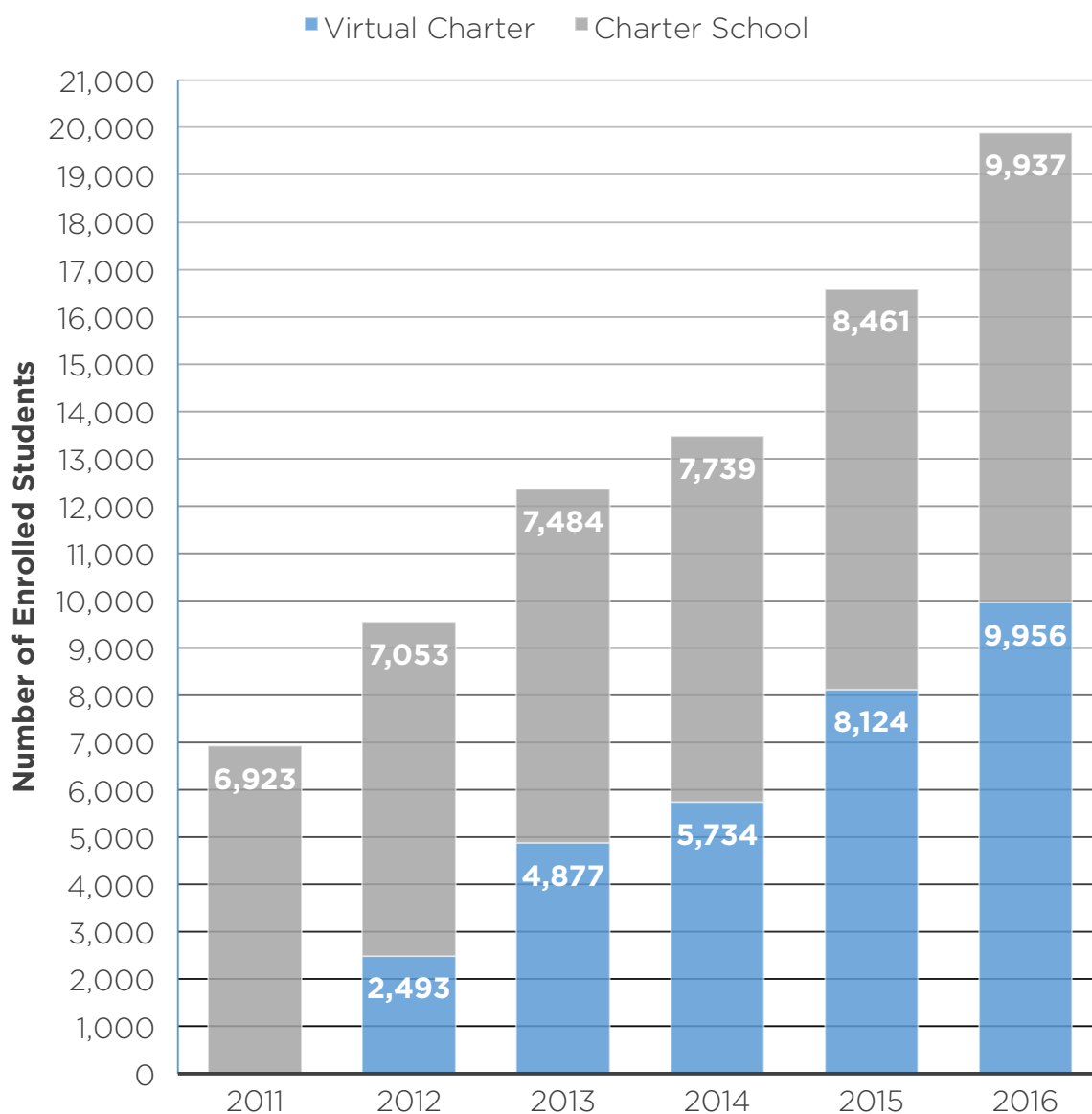

Oklahoma Charter Enrollment

During the 2015-2016 school year, 29 charter schools served 20,150 students, or about 2.9% of the overall student population in Oklahoma public schools. The number of students served by charter schools has increased dramatically over the last few years as a result of the expansion of virtual charter schools, which have more than tripled their student population since 2011-2012.

Charter School Enrollment 2011-2016

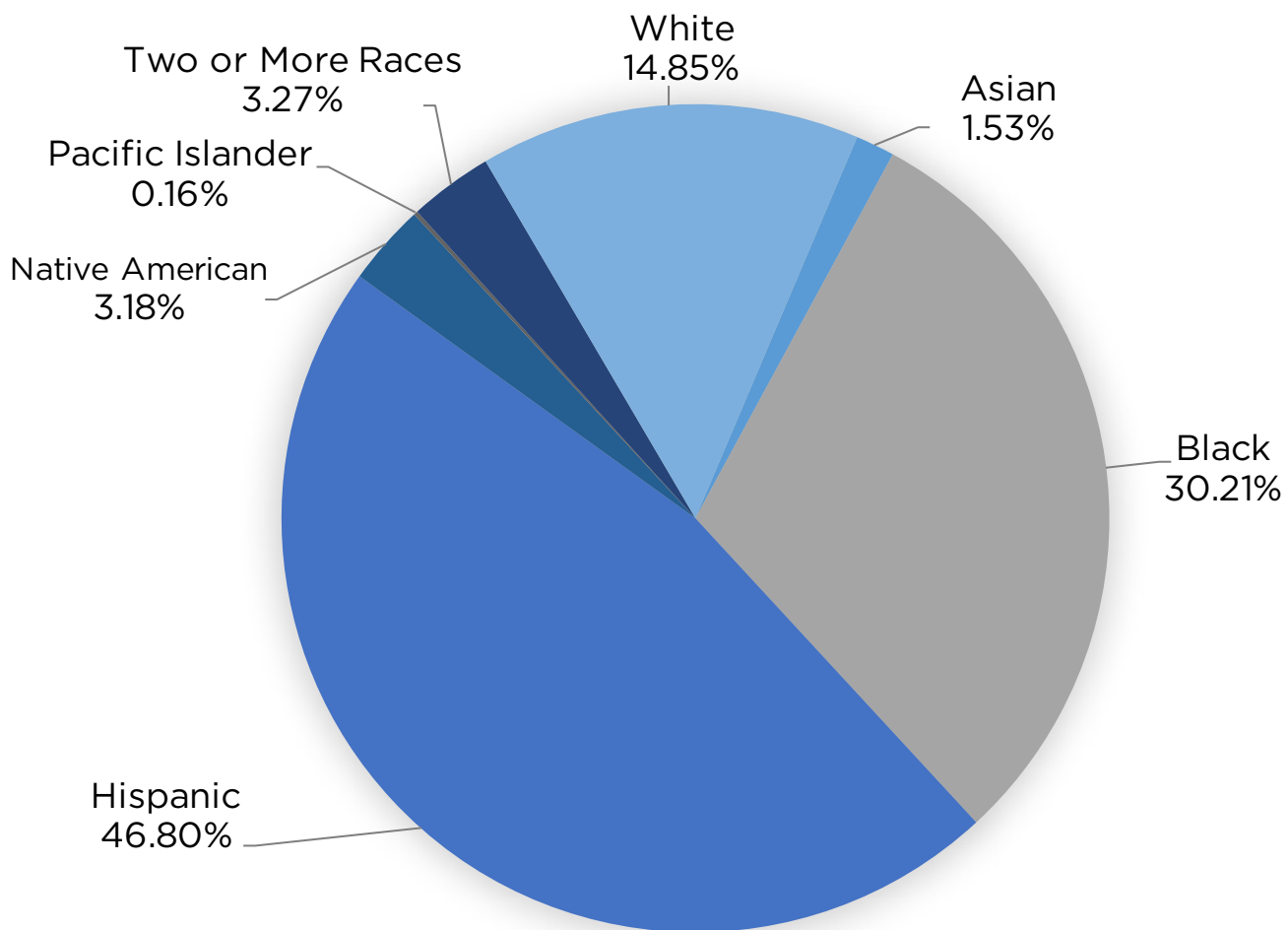

Oklahoma Charter Demographics

Brick-and-mortar and virtual charters have vastly different demographic ratios. Brick-and-Mortar Charter School Population

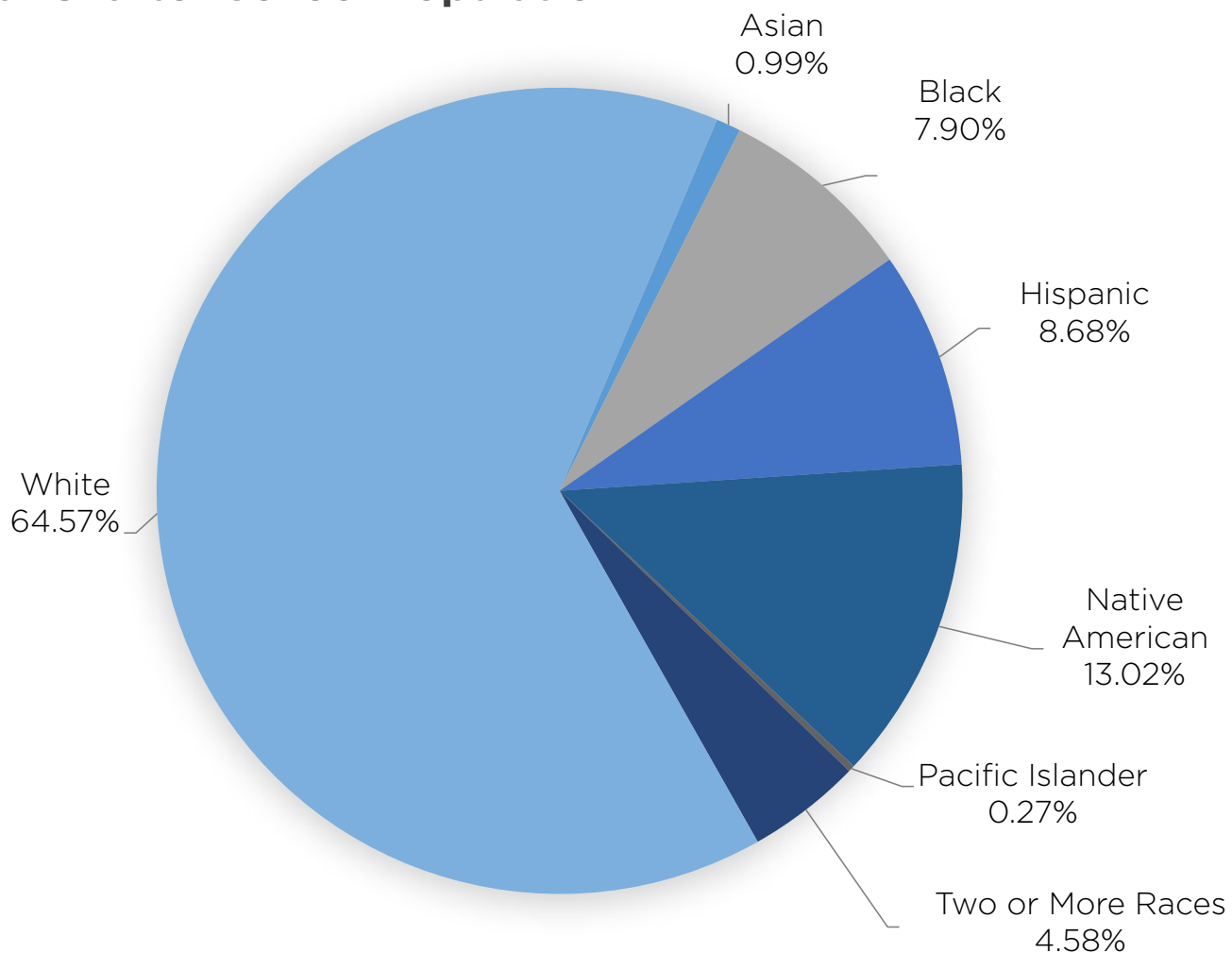

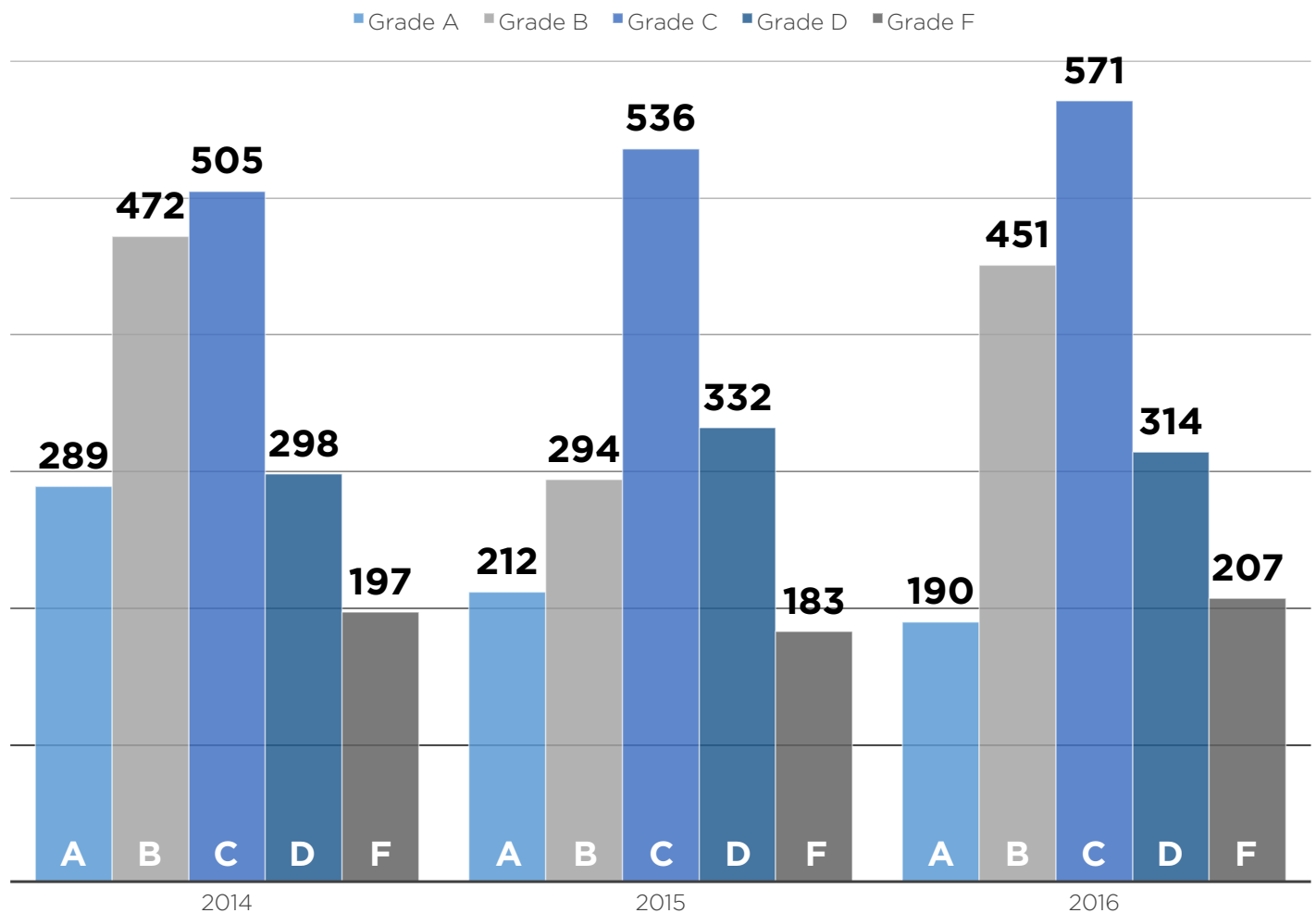

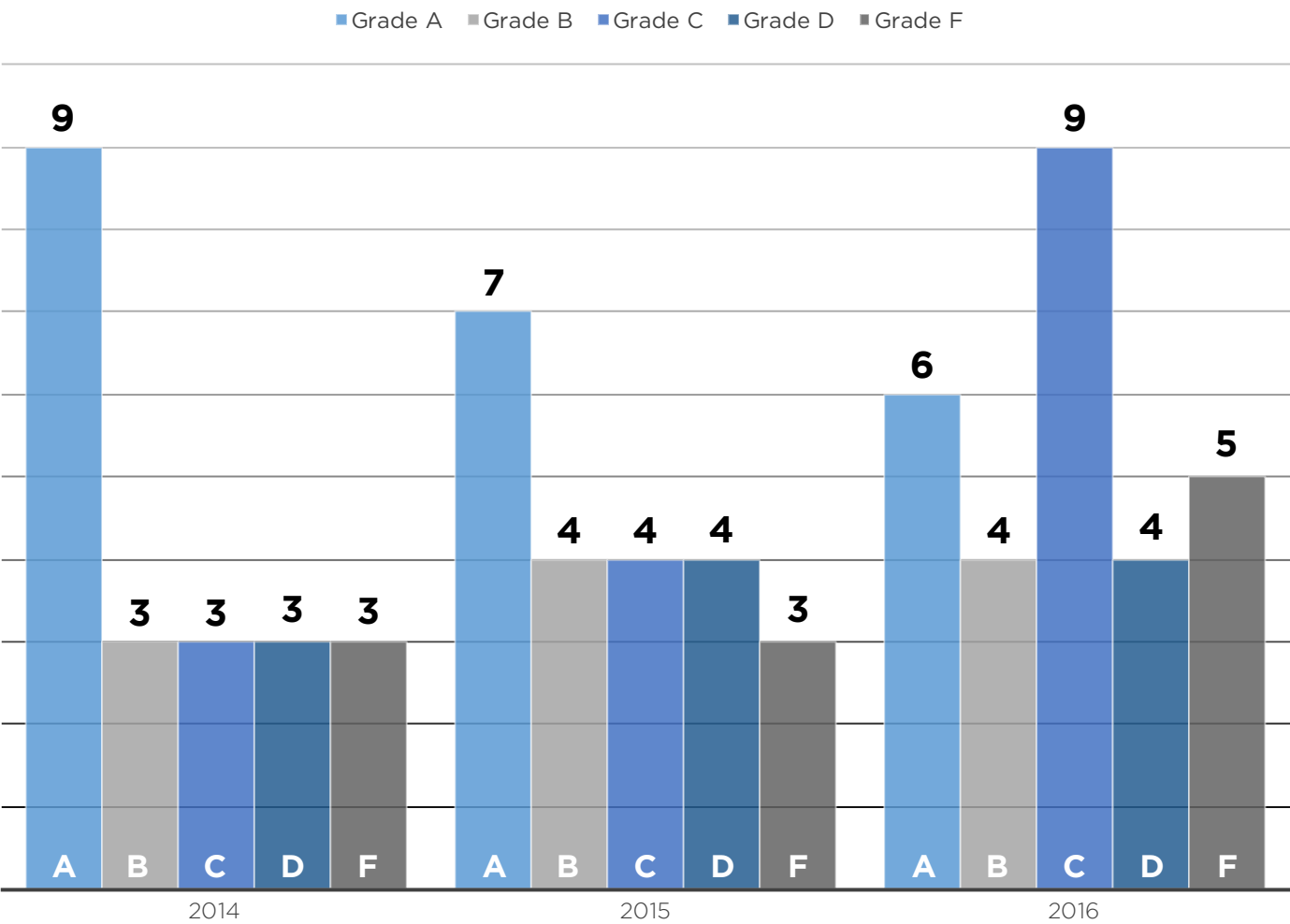

Brick-and-Mortar Charter Schools: A-F Report Card

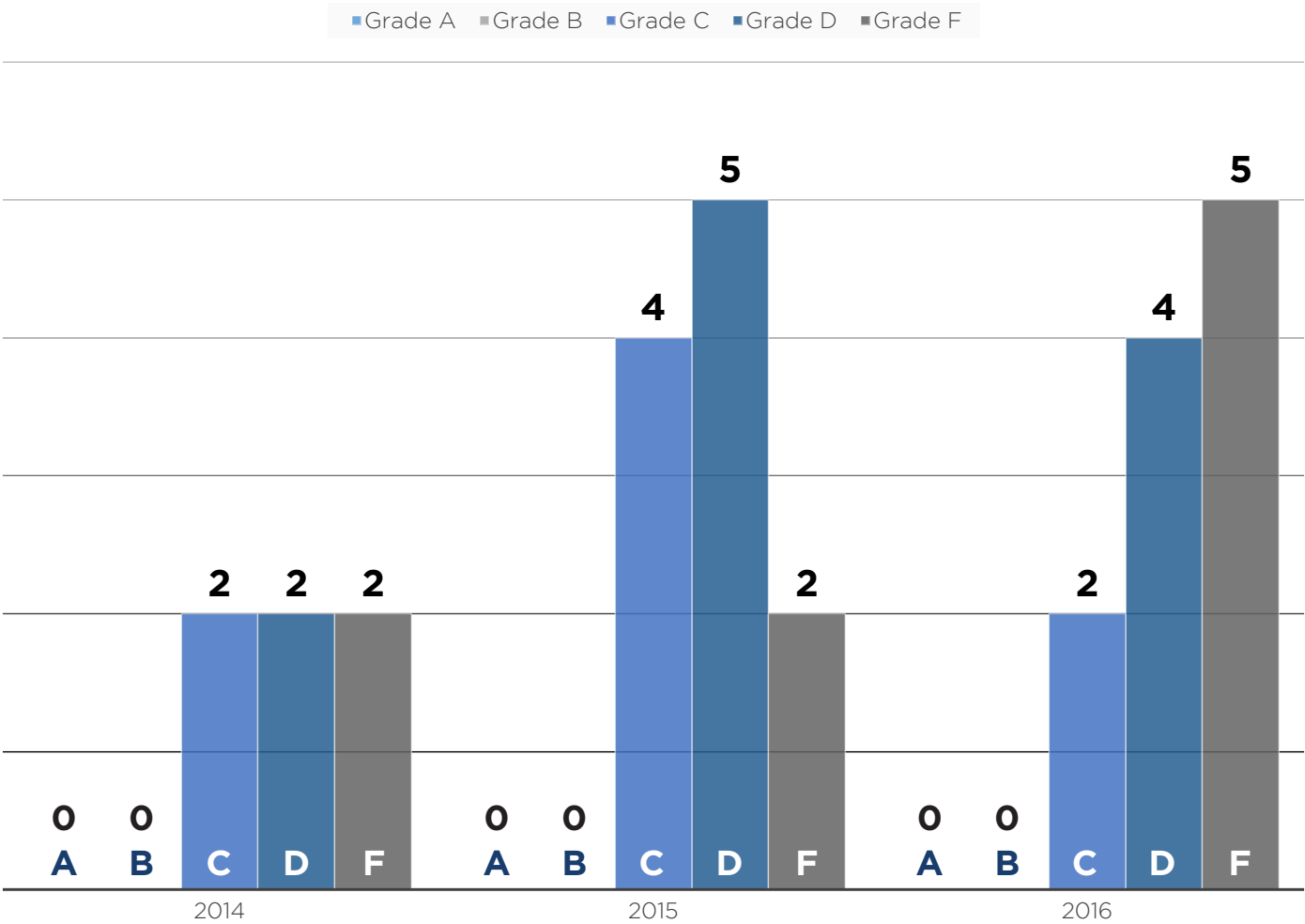

The Virtual Charter Schools A-F graph below shows the Report Card grades received by each virtual charter site in the state over the last three years.

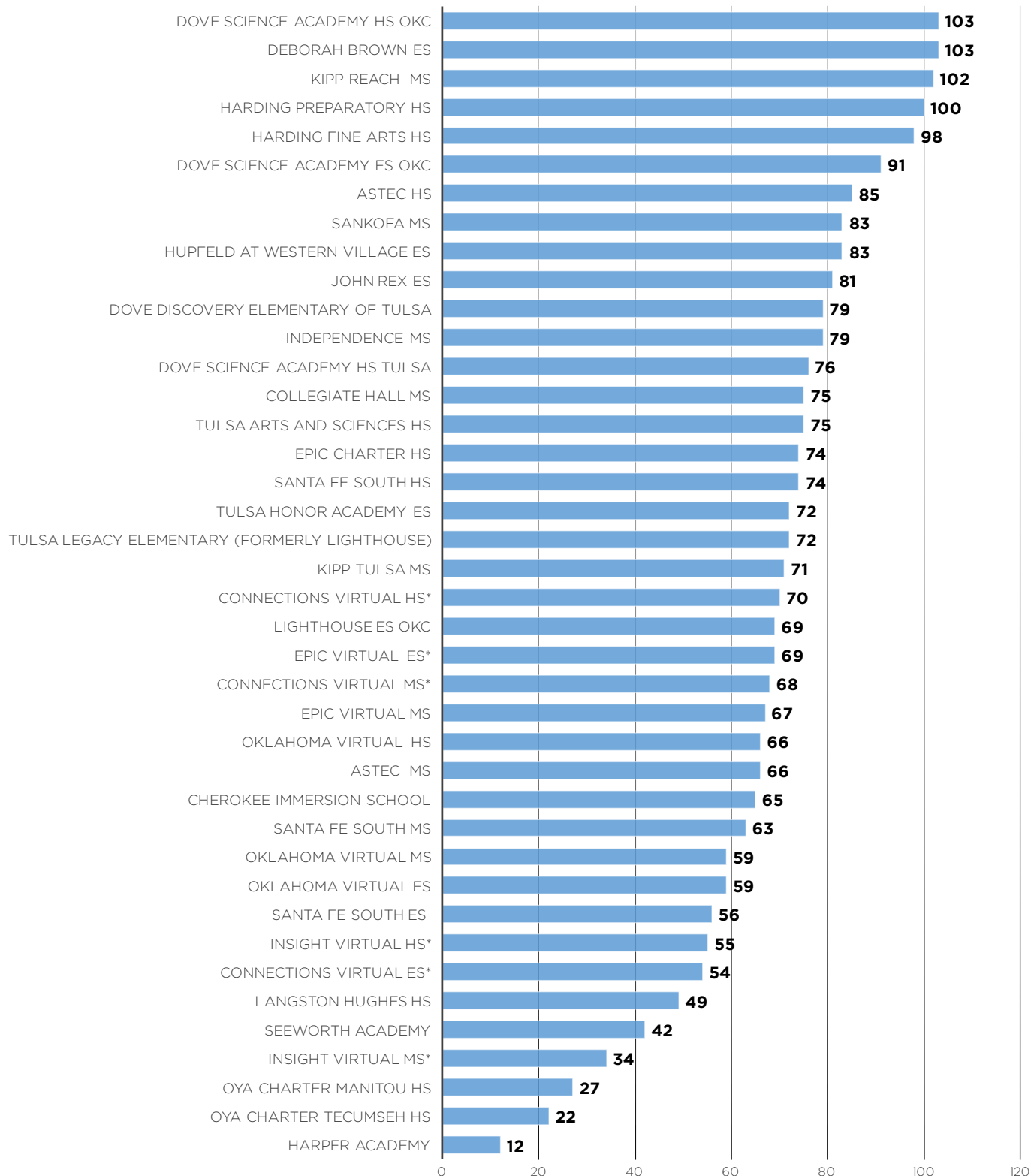
Virtual Charter Schools: A-F Report Card

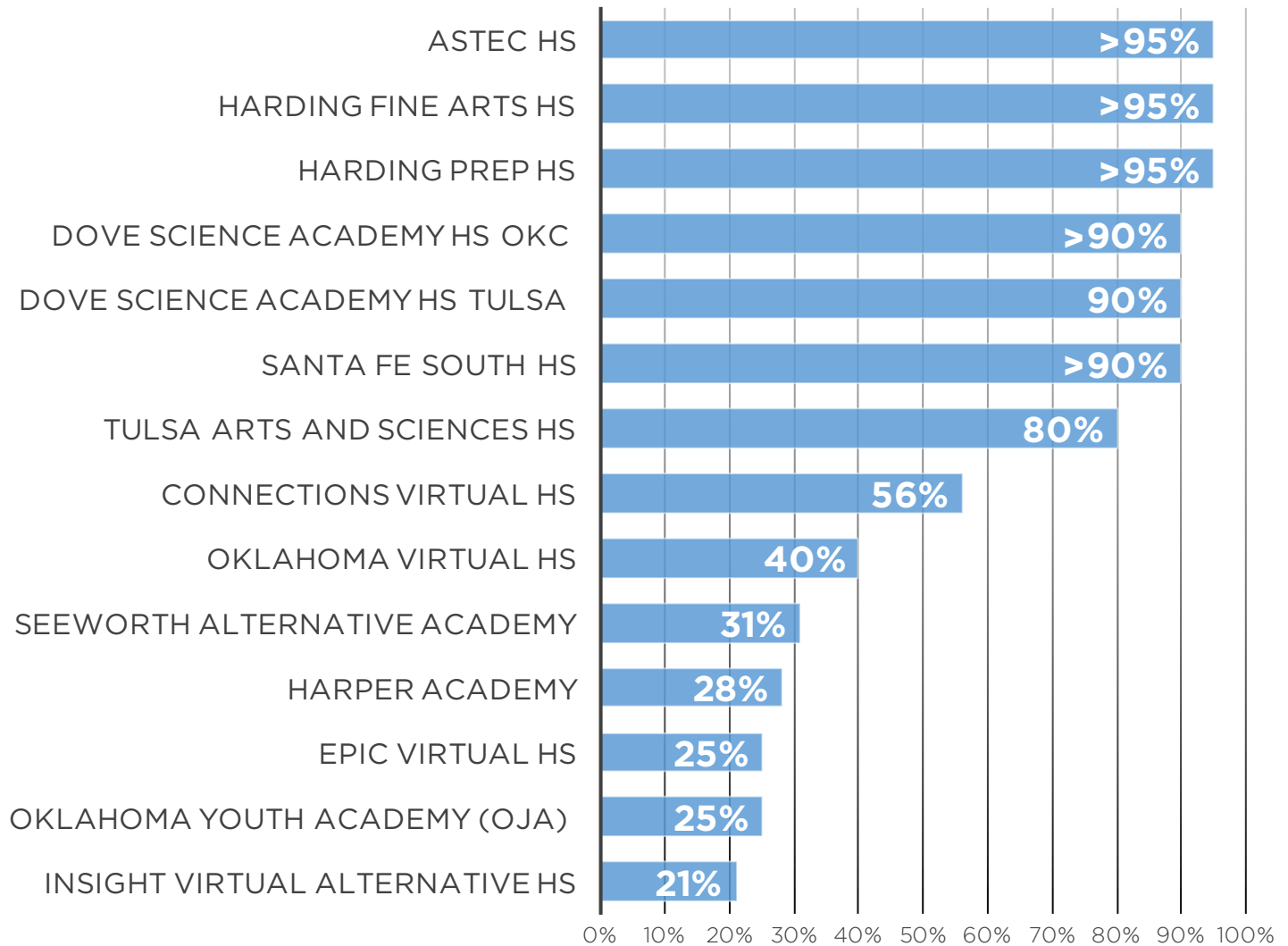

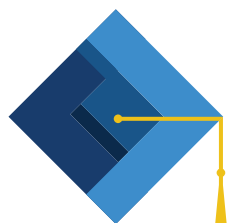
